Subjects of study are one thing. How the subjects of study are approached and presented to students is another. Some subjects are appropriate choices and others are honestly a waste of time. This is true with regards to both secular and religious subjects. Unless parents actively intervene in their children's education, they will find that their children may very well be taught a whole bunch of facts and figures, but rarely, if is not up to you to complete ever, will they be taught to think!
