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The Solution for Islamic Extremism

In spite of misunderstandings of doctrine, and theology, Christians, Muslims and Jews do embrace the same God, be He called, Heavenly Father, Allah, or HaShem.

If Islam were to abandon extremism, and violence, and were to missionize the world, in a way similar to Christian missionaries, they might make so many converts that Islam might indeed in short time become the world's largest religion.

Indeed, it is Islamic violence and extremism that is preventing the spread of Islam, a contradiction of Islam itself.

In theological matters, we can agree to disagree, and respect one another accordingly. We can still inspire others, not with the words we preach, but with the deeds we do, and the lives we lead.

Finding common denominators upon which to build unity should be the essential focus of all peoples of good-will.

Let Islam (and all other religions, movements, and groups) shine their true non-violent, non-extremist light. Let the world see it, and admire it, for the true good it really has to offer.
